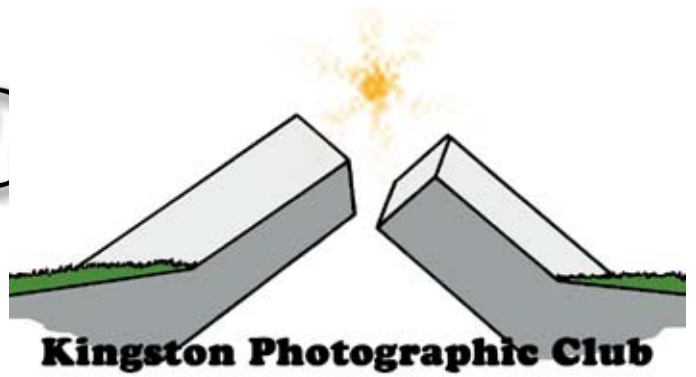

**Exploring the Characteristics of Light – Sirmilik National Park**

Sirmilik, *The Place of Glaciers*, is one of our more spectacular and remote National Parks. Co-situated on Bylot Island and the northern tip of Baffin Island, the park is a landscape of fiords, mountains and glaciers. Through two slide presentations that highlight images of the Park and its nearest Inuit community, Pond Inlet, we will examine the characteristics of light and how it can enhance the impact & mood of photographs. A discussion on metering approaches to best capture the subtle characteristics of magical light will round out the evening.

Bill Pratt has been a photographer for the past 25 years. During the Quebec Separation Crisis in the mid-nineties he became very concerned that Canada might be lost. From that time on he has focussed his attention on travelling to different parts of Canada to capture its majesty and rugged beauty. His photographs are a reminder and a motivator to keep us all together. ## Tips on creating Digital Slideshows

1. Select a group of images that tell a story, explore a subject or place, or convey a mood. The preferred length of a slideshow is 3 to 5 minutes, so you will need 40 to 60 images to create a show.
2. Don't assume your selection of slides is final until you match them to the music.
3. Don't be too concerned about the number of slides and the length of your music track until you have all title slides and end slides in the project. Timings can, and will, change as the show develops. Also, slides can be added or deleted to match the music track, and music tracks can be edited.
4. The music can make or break a slideshow. It is easily as important as the images, since it sets the mood and, if complementary to the images, will greatly increase the impact of those images.  
The music has to be appropriate from your point of view and that of your audience. When you have made your initial image selection and it is time to plan the order of slides in the show, it is also time to listen to some music tracks as you are arranging the slides to get a feel for how each will complement your images.
5. Image variety is desirable in order to maintain audience interest. After all, you can only look at a certain number of images of one kind of flower, no matter how good they are.
6. Image quality is, of course, very important, but not every image has to be a winner to tell the story.
7. Make the theme clear to the audience by careful selection and ordering of images. It has to flow logically or esthetically, and connect to the music.
8. View lots of AV shows to get ideas for presentation techniques.
9. Test and refine the show until you are truly happy with it. Then have it reviewed by someone whose opinion you value. Then refine it some more. Remember the difference between ordinary and extraordinary is the little "extra".
10. Always leave them wanting more.

## Resizing Digital Images

Image resolution determines what you can and cannot do with a file. Resolution refers to the number of squares or PIXELS that describe an image and establish its detail. For prints, a higher resolution image is required. For email or web/computer display, a lower resolution is needed.

Here are some tips and steps:

### TIPS

- If you plan to print your images, capture your digital images at the highest resolution. You can always make files smaller for email or web.
- Significant resizing (150-200%) of an image from small to large in one-step will decrease image quality. Photoshop and other image editing programs must “guess” or “interpolate” the *added* information. If you need to resize an image, rather than making one large leap in resizing, resize increments of 10% (ideal) to 25% maximum. It is possible to increase an image to poster size without any major loss in quality. Alternatively, software plug-in programs such as Genuine Fractals ([www.ononesoftware.com](http://www.ononesoftware.com)), BlowUp ([www.alienskin.com/blowup/index.html](http://www.alienskin.com/blowup/index.html)) can resize images, often with minimal loss in quality.
- When you resize an image, rename the file to prevent loss of the original sized image.

### STEPS – Resizing Digital Camera Images

Digital cameras that are set to capture jpeg images have image files with large physical dimensions but low in resolution e.g., 72 ppi. The trick is to decrease the dimensions and increase the resolution or pixel density.

**NOTE:** If you capture the images in the RAW format, the RAW file conversion program will make adjustments to the physical dimensions based on your input.

Follow these steps:

1. Open the digital file and the **Image Size** window in your image-editing program.
2. Under the **Document Size** section, notice that the **Resolution** setting is 72 ppi, a resolution that is appropriate for viewing on the screen. For printing, set the resolution between 200 – 300 ppi (see \*\*). Also notice that at 72 ppi the document size is quite large e.g., 22 inches for the widest dimension.
3. Uncheck the **Resampling Image** checkbox.
4. Enter a higher resolution e.g., 240 ppi. Automatically the width and height will be adjusted down in the exact same proportion...without changing the number of original pixels!! The pixels are just packed more densely i.e., 240 ppi vs 72 ppi. Quality remains unchanged, that is, no interpolation has occurred.
5. Recheck the **Resampling Image** checkbox
6. Click **OK** to exit the **Image Size** window. Notice that file size or **Pixel Dimensions** changed. However, if you have the **Ruler** feature turned on, you will see a change

- It is extremely useful to view fine art prints in real life (even excellent magazine quality doesn't quite convey all the subtle details of the original work).

in the image's physical dimension or **Document Size**.

**In summary, the above steps did three things:**

1. Physical dimensions/Document Size are reduced
2. Resolution has increased - which is needed for printing
3. No interpolation - image quality is unchanged
